Cresskill Brook

"Planting along Cresskill Brook" has been on EJTU's schedule for a number of months, so here is an update on the project.

Cresskill Brook is a small stream in Bergen County that holds a population of native Brook Trout but that also has barriers that inhibit the fishes' mobility. One of the barriers is on the site of a long gone mill where a dam and a pond block normal water flow. The present owners of the property would like to remove the blockages and, with their own money plus funds from grants, have raised enough money to complete the needed work.

EJTU is involved because one of the grantors, National Fish and Wildlife Foundation (NFWF), needed an appropriate local, tax-exempt organization through which the funds can be handled. The terms of the funding from NFWF requires that the amount of the grant be matched by an equal amount of funds or by an equivalent amount of work on the project.

A part of the equivalent work will be the planting of vegetation along the banks of the rejuvenated stream. The plants will be supplied to EJTU so there will be no expense but we will either have to do the planting ourselves or find volunteer groups that can do the work under our direction.

We expect that the planting will

Fly Fishing for Trout: A Guide's Perspective

April Fly of the Month

Our mostly snowless winter is over and April is bringing longer days, opening day and the early hatches. The first hatch of the year is usually the early black stonefly but

some of our cold weather fishermen



have reported that the stoneflies were here in March. There may be more of them to come so look for these tiny (size 18) stones that can frequently be seen crawling out of the water to hatch.



The first mayfly of the year will usually be the tiny (size 22 or 24) blue winged olives, and of course

we cannot overlook the midges. But don't worry; the larger flies are only a few weeks away.

When you tie these flies for your first outings tie an extra dozen or two and give them to Elio Chiavola or any board member for the Chapter's supplies.

2012 Freshwater Fish and Wildlife Digest

Now that fishing season is upon us it's a good time to re-read New Jersey's freshwater fishing regulations..

Retail sporting goods stores that sell fishing licenses should have copies available but, if you prefer the electronic version, you can visit the Division of Fish and Wildlife's site and read the PDF version, print it all or print only the pages in which you are interested.

Fishing the Briny

Don't forget, if you intend to fish in New Jersey or New York's salt water you will have to register with the State in whose water you will fish; if you think that you will fish in both States, you will have to register in both of them. And, according to a New Jersey email to sportsmen, "Anglers 16 and older must register with the state system even if they have already registered with the federal system". These registrations are not considered licenses but, while the aim is different, the effect is the same.



Registration in New Jersey is free so, if you are only going to fish in New Jersey's marine and tidal waters, just register at the Department of Environmental Protection's web site. The web site is http://www.nj.gov/dep/saltwaterregistry/index.html. You might consider New Jersey's salt water registration to be an unnecessary intrusion but if the State did not offer it you would have to pay \$15 to the Federal Government for the same thing. Last year 251,000 registered in New Jersey

and 120,000 have already registered through March of 2012.

If you are going to fish New York waters you will also have to register with New York State. Here again it's free but, if you want to fish for stripers in the Hudson up to the Tappan Zee Bridge, you must have your New York registration card with you.

You can register with New York at the same DECALS web site (https://nyfgisales.appsolgrp.com/fgnyia/html/index.jsp) that is used for fresh water fishing licenses. One difference from New York's fresh water licenses is that the salt water registration follows federal guidelines and is valid from January 1 to December 31.
