Herman Drenth

Herman was the a past President of East Jersey TU and was also the Chair of our EJTU Conservation Committee. This is a portion of his obituary that appeared in the July 26, 2013 issue of the Bergen Record:

Herman Drenth, 84, of Elmwood Park passed away on July 24, 2013.

Born and raised in Paramus, Mr. Drenth lived in Elmwood Park for the past forty years.

Mr. Drenth was a Veteran of the United States Army Air Corps. He was a member and Past-President for many years of both the Dumont Chess Club and the East Jersey Trout Unlimited, was active in conservation of the Ramapo River by both helping to clean the river as well as plant trees along the banks and loved fishing, fly-fishing and golf but one of his greatest pleasures was raising funds to provide chess sets to veteran hospitals, of which he helped donate many.

He is survived by his beloved wife of forty-five years, Marilyn (nee Greene) of Elmwood Park, whom he was deeply devoted to and cared for with all he had within.

When Herman wrote his column for Riffles he always ended it with this:

"Remember, we all live downstream"

August's Speaker

Brian Cowden will explain how to apply proper pressure and fight fish quickly when Catch & Release fishing. This will be is an interactive program with audience participation.

Members will "fight" a fish (a small scale) using a fly rod. The "angler" will tell the person holding the scale how much pressure they think they are putting on the fish - while using a 6X or 7X tippet. Their guesses are recorded with the actual numbers to be revealed after everyone goes through this exercise.

Power Point slides will show proper rod angle when fighting a big fish. Also to be covered: how to quickly tire a fish and bring it to net or hand.

Home Depot Veteran's Discount

NY Fishing Licenses

You still have one month left on your New York State freshwater fishing license but remember that, unlike New Jersey,

the New York License is valid from October 1 through September 30.

Sunny Days

As the summer heat and humidity drives water temperatures up some of us head for our favorite ponds and lakes in search of the ever-present and often challenging sunfish. Be it a bluegill or pumpkinseed I am convinced that if they ever grew to the size of a largemouth they would become a highly sought after and prized freshwater trophy. While warm water drives these little warriors farther from shore and deeper in the water column they will still be feeding on dragon fly and damsel fly nymphs and any other critters that might appear among the weeds.

I am always looking for new and improved sunny flies. Recently I got a tying lesson on a pattern that its creator guarantees catches fish. You have to start with a trip to your local CVS, Walgreen's or similar retail outlet. Head for the cosmetics isle and

get one bottle each of neon green and blaze orange opaque nail polish.

The recipe follows.

Long shank streamer hook in size 12 to 8

White thread Buck tail

Some cheap, soft dry fly Hackle any light color Nail polish as above

The process is like a standard stimulator pattern except for using hair from the top of the buck tail for the tail and wing. This hair is not as hollow as the hair on the underside of the tail so it does not float well. That is the idea. You want the fly to suspend a few inches to a foot or so below the surface.

Tie on the Buck tail with the butt ends extended on top of the shaft to about 1/8" from the eye. Tie in a hackle by the tip at the bend of

the hook and wrap the thread to cover the butt ends completely. Coat the thread with either green or orange nail polish. You may have to use several coats to get complete coverage. Palmer wrap the hackle to the front of the hook leaving about 1/4 ". Tie in another hackle sized no larger than the hook gap. Tie in a wing of buck tail allowing the butt ends to extend nearly to the eye. The wing should be fairly sparse so as not to create too large a profile. Wrap the thread over the butts. Coat the thread wraps with nail polish until well covered. Wrap the hackle as you would on a dry fly to form the head but be sure the nail polish color shows through. Whip finish and apply another drop of polish.

I think they look best when you use the same color nail polish throughout, but then who knows

what a sunfish sees. You can alter the sink rate by using heavier hooks and less buck tail or hackle. I would not add weight as that will cause the fly to sink quickly. The proper result is to have the fly sink slowly and suspend at the desired depth.
