Fishing the Ramapo

Usually when the State truck arrives at Glen Gray Road in late May for the final spring stocking the Ramapo is shallow, slow and warm - in some years the best description is puddles. This year, however, the river was high and fast throughout all of the weeks of stocking so there was plenty of good water in which the fish could move around.

After the usual Jersey summer, we would expect the Ramapo to show us its rocky bottom when the October stocking - the last of the year for the State – takes place. But not this year! This year when the State's final stocking took place on October 14 the river, as it had been for a number of weeks, was running very high and fast. Because we did not float stock that day our volunteers had to carry the State's large breeders up and down stream in buckets, and only two or three of the big fish could fit in each

At EJTU's October 29 stocking we float and bucket stocked a few hundred active fish in the morning just before the snow storm (not a traditional three-day Nor'easter as the illiterati press proclaims) paralyzed the area. Because of the downed trees and lost electric service caused by the snow it's unlikely that people will have had a chance to put many of these fish in creels.

So what's the point of this stocking history? Simply that if you are willing to endure some chilly water you may find fishing to be pretty good in the Ramapo River in late fall and winter this year.

Progress on Bat Deaths

US Geological Survey microbiologist David Blehert and his colleagues have published a paper in *Nature* that proves that the white fungus appearing on the noses and wings of hibernating bats is what causes their deaths. Prior to this there was considerable debate as to whether White Nose Syndrome caused the bats' deaths or whether it was merely associated with another dis-



easethatwastherealkiller.

The re-

searchers also found that if they removed infected bats from the areas in which they were hibernating, placed them in warm surroundings and gave them food and water, the infection cleared up within weeks. However, since it is impossible to do this with the number of bats that are infected, other cures will have to be found and this may take quite a while.

Insect eating bats provide free pest control services to the agriculture industry but in the northeast approximately 80 percent of the bats have died from White Nose Syndrome since it appeared in NY State in 2006. The Journal *Science* published a study in April that said that the loss of bats could cost agriculture at least \$3.7 billion a year.

2012 Salt Water Registries



If you intend to hit the beaches and fish the fall striper migration don't forget that you have to register with New Jersey's salt water registry.

It's not considered a license but, while the aim is different, the effect is the same. It would be a shame to catch nothing but a big fine during your outing on the sand.

In a few weeks you will have to start the process all over again if you intend to fish in salt water any time in 2012 because the salt water registries expire in December.

Registration in New Jersey is free so, if you are only going to fish in New Jersey's marine and tidal waters, you can register at the Department of Environmental Protection's web site. The free 2012 registrations had not yet begun in the first week of November but DEP states that they will begin "in early November". The web site is http://www.nj.gov/dep/saltwaterreg-

waters in 2012 you will have to also register with New York State. Here again it's free but, if you want to fish for stripers in the Hudson up to the Tappan Zee Bridge, you must have your New York registration card with you.

You can register with New York at the same DECALS web site (https://nyfgisales.appsolgrp.com/fgnyia/html/index.jsp) that is used for fresh water fishing licenses. One difference from New York's fresh water licenses is that the salt water registration follow federal guidelines and are valid from January 1 to December 31.

Election of Officers
