I later analyzed this strange reaction, first thinking that it was caused by memories of the various things that I had been "up to" while growing up in pre-condo Hoboken but then realizing that the real cause was that I rarely saw groups of children of any age in any neighborhood. Of course, in spring children are seen on baseball fields and, as the seasons progress, others, or maybe the same ones in different sports gear, are out



playing soccer and football. But, they are rarely unsupervised. Rarely just kicking rocks around. It has reached the point where, when my wife and I see children on bicycles while we are in our car, one or the other of us will invariably laugh and say, "Look! Kids! All by themselves! Where are their parents?"

Parents claim that their children spend less time outdoors than they themselves did because of competition from television, computers and video games, or even because of more dangerous traffic and a heavier homework burden. But, Richard Louv, author of "*Last Child In The Woods*", argues that children are kept indoors because of their parents' overblown fear of strangers.

Probably because of the media's concentration on evil, death and disaster, a large

Save Water!

Most of our meetings involve discussions about fishing and places to fish but since we are primarily a conservation organization here is a way to save water. The last quarterly water bill that I received from United Water contained an insert promoting the worthwhile kits that are briefly described below so you probably received one too. But, I'm giving you a second chance to consider the offers because if you're like me you toss out most of the glossy advertisements that accompany bills without reading them.

We wrote about these water saving kits that United Water is offering in previous issues of Riffles. First, let me say that I purchased two of the outdoor kits when they were last offered and they are not cheap junk. They are just as sturdy and useful as any that you can purchase in a hardware store, Home Depot or Lowes.

The Standard Kit contains two massage shower heads, a kitchen swivel faucet aerator, two dye packs, and two toilet tank banks that displace water so older tanks can use less water with each flush. The retail value of the kit is \$30 but United Water sells them for \$5.

at play is laughable, but I wonder if these stay-at-home children will venture outside when they become adults. Will they be afraid of stepping into a flowing river, or walking through a pathless forest? Will they be averse to all risk and need a helmet, elbow and knee pads, and wrist guards if they decide to go for a walk in a park? And, if they have children what will they teach them?

Others have taken up the cause of curing what Richard Louv describes as Nature *Deficit Disorder* by starting a program named, No Child Left Inside. The program has been described in The Economist, USA Today and other periodicals, and is actively promoted in Connecticut, Massachusetts, Michigan, South Dakota and other states. Moreover, Congressman John Sarbanes of Maryland and Senator Jack Reed of Rhode Island introduced legislation, each entitled the No Child Left Inside Act of 2008 in the House (H.R.3036) and the Senate (S.1981).

No Child Left Inside attempts to engender a love of the outdoors by promoting what the Chesapeake Bay Foundation classifies as Environmental Education, an interdisciplinary program that includes both classroom and outdoors programs. Since one of the aims is also to boost student achievement in math, science, reading, writing and social studies, educators and parents can hardly object.

There are risks in almost everything that we do but, when parents are overly protective children have little opportunity to develop independent judgment so No Child Left Inside is a step in the right direction. But, in teaching a love of the outdoors by structured classroom work and supervised field activities, are we just moving the envelope of parent's protectiveness to schools that use the program? When are children going to be able to splash in puddles, pull up weeds and look at the roots, and fall down while running free?

I was disappointed and surprised to read another one-sided article in the monthly "Riffles" rejecting the crisis of global warming. It's important to look at two sides of an issue, but Vol. 38 (August 2008) of Riffles contained the second piece I've noticed that was decidedly slanted toward a pointof-view that I see as tenuous and overtly political. It's especially galling to read such a biased, unsigned piece reprinted in a publication connect (sic) to Trout Unlimited.

T.U. published a landmark study last year, "Healing Troubled Waters: Preparing Trout and Salmon Habitat for a Changing Climate," acknowledging the disastrous effects that a changing climate is having and will have on our fisheries. I encourage all members to take a look at what our organization has to say about climate change at www.tu.org/ climatechange.

In the meantime, pieces like "Cool It, Al!" in the last Riffles accomplish little beyond spreading misinformation on a topic crucial

The Outdoor Landscape Kit is the one that I bought. It has a six-position garden hose nozzle, a sprinkler timer, a rain gauge, a moisture meter, and a hose end repair kit. The cost is \$7 for this \$40 retail value kit. When I am in doubt about watering, I stick the moisture meter into the ground and check the reading to see if watering is necessary. I can then attach the sprinkler timer to a sprinkler or to my soaker hoses and set the watering time for an hour or two and forget about it since it shuts off automatically after the set period of time is reached.

The Deluxe Kit has a massage shower head, a handheld massage shower head, three bathroom faucet aerators, 3 toilet tank banks, three dye packs, a "shower coach" (looks like a small hour glass type timer), and Teflon tape to use when installing the showerheads. The cost is \$15 for a retail value of \$65.
